Crisis Intervention—Mental Health Deputies

Coastal Plains Integrated Health and San Patricio County Constable Kody Fahrenthold collaborated to establish the Mental Health Deputy Program to enhance crisis response to the local rural populations. San Patricio County assisted in funding this program through the American Rescue Plan Act (A.R.P.A.).

The purpose of the Mental Health Deputy Program is to help improve crisis response by diverting people needing behavioral health crisis services from hospitals, E.R.s and jails to community-based alternatives that provide effective behavioral health treatment. Constable Kody Fahrenthold and Deputy Constable Mark Lemons have been trained to respond to an active mental health crisis situation, and emergency detention. They are also able to provide transportation, and provide follow-up appointments after a crisis. Working in conjunction with CPIH's Mobile Crisis Outreach team, the MH Deputies will respond to calls regarding active mental health crisis situations that may require law enforcement intervention.

In addition to crisis response, MH Deputies will also provide Crisis Intervention Training to various law enforcement offices such as the Taft Police Department, Sinton Police Department, and the Police Academy.

Both MH Deputies are active as of January 1st and housed at the Aransas Pass Clinic location. Funding has also allowed for the purchase of 2 units for the MH Deputies to utilize as they serve San Patricio County. Deputy Constable Ron Howe is also undergoing training to provide services for San Patricio County.

This program marks the initial phase in CPIH's efforts to strengthen crisis response. CPIH's long-term goal is to extend this program to all remaining counties and ensure comprehensive coverage.





Clinical Services Division

The Center recently created a Clinical Services Division to improve clinical care provided by Coastal Plains Integrated Health. The first step needed to get this division underway was to create a Chief Clinical Officer (CCO) position that would oversee this new program. I posted the position internally and ended up hiring Mr. Joel J. Johnson who has been employed with the Center for over 26 years. Mr. Johnson is a license professional counselor-supervisor (LPC-S) and transitioned into his new role in the month of January 2024. His charge is to provide oversight to our Center's license professional counseling (LPC) staff who provide intake services and cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT). His goal over the next several months will be to improve access to care and create a uniform intake process at each location. LPC staff who provide intake services are the

gatekeepers to care and their scheduling has been as far out as three months in some locations. Our CBT program has also had a waiting list that has grown over the past year and the CCO will be expected to reduce the amount of time it takes to see a therapist at our Center. In addition, the CCO will also be in charge of our Center's crisis intervention team (CIT). Mr. Johnson's focus will be on minimizing turnover for this program and creating a uniform crisis approach to care. Mr. Johnson will work closely with our Center's Quality Assurance department to provide feedback regarding these critical services and improvements that have been made over time. As a Texas Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (T-CCBHC) our emphasis is on integrating primary care and substance use into our mental health care setting with the goal of improving health outcomes. As a T-CCBHC we must meet stringent criteria around timeliness of access in order to remain eligible for this credential. The timing for this new division couldn't be better since we have our recertification coming up next year.

Overcoming Challenges Together

Ramiro Longoria Jr. came to Coastal Plains in 2018 to seek help for his behavioral health. Following an injury that left him disabled, Mr. Longoria had to leave his occupation as a welder, leaving him at a loss for supporting his family. Due to this event from this event and other ongoing issues, Mr. Longoria had a lot of distress that would lead to altercations with family, school staff, and other individuals. After an altercation, Mr. Longoria was brought to the center by his family, and he was enrolled in services with Kelly Huynh-Scott. He explained that he did not remember the first few months he entered services. Mr. Longoria recalls, "I was different back then. I was in a dark place. From what they told me, I wouldn't make eye contact and could be very standoffish." While initially hesitant to

receiving mental health services, Mr. Longoria expressed gratitude towards those who supported him and encouraged him to seek help when he needed it the most. "When I came into to service, I thought this place was a joke. Kelly and my family helped me get back on track. She brought me back to reality," he stated.

Mr. Longoria has a strong support system with his family who help him stay on track. After his separation, his sister bought him some land where he could reside and raise animals with his son. His family has been very supportive of his mental health journey, helping him keep up with his treatment and medication. They also help him keep track of his finances and help with his son when they can. His older children check in on him and assist him when he needs help.

Due to his experience with Coastal Plains, Mr. Longoria decided to enroll his son, Ramiro Longoria III, in Youth and Family Services. Mr. Longoria's son was having behavioral problems that would present themselves in the classroom, becoming very disruptive. The school had called Coastal Plains for crisis, after which Mr. Longoria decided to enroll him into the program. After his enrollment, his son started seeing Dr. Maruvada (Medical Director) and Mary Lisa Duarte (Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner) and was able to receive counseling and medication. By having regular meetings with his Case Manager, Janie Sanchez, his son proceeded to succeed academically, even coming out the top of his class with an A honor roll. He is top in reading, finished all his Ist-grade math curriculum in 12 weeks, and has moved on to learning 2nd-grade math. While he is currently assigned a shadow at school who helps him when he's having trouble, the school anticipates him being more independent when he reaches junior high.

Mr. Longoria enjoys bonding with his son, helping him grow with 4H, and even helping other kids in 4H when they are struggling. He remarks, "When I was going through all of this, I thought to myself, who was going to help my kid with all this? Everything that I'm doing, I'm doing for him." Last year, Mr. Longoria and his son raised goats for 4H. This year, they have chosen to raise rabbits. They hope to continue to raise more animals as he teaches his son responsibility. Mr. Longoria hopes that by sharing his and his son's successes, they will encourage anybody who has doubts in receiving mental health services to seek help when needed.

Mr. Longoria was asked to join the Planning Network Advisory Committee this year. The committee consists of Coastal Plains clients who review and provide input on service updates for Coastal Plains. Coastal Plains is glad to receive his feedback and the company commends both him and his son for their continued progress towards recovery.

Certificate of Accomplishment by Children's Director Linda Ramos-Perez, YES Waiver Program Manager Imelda Barrera-Garcia, and YES Waiver Facilitator Jen Garcia. Jonathan told his team he would miss his Case Manager, Jennifer, and his Recreational Therapist, Lexis Vallejo. 
